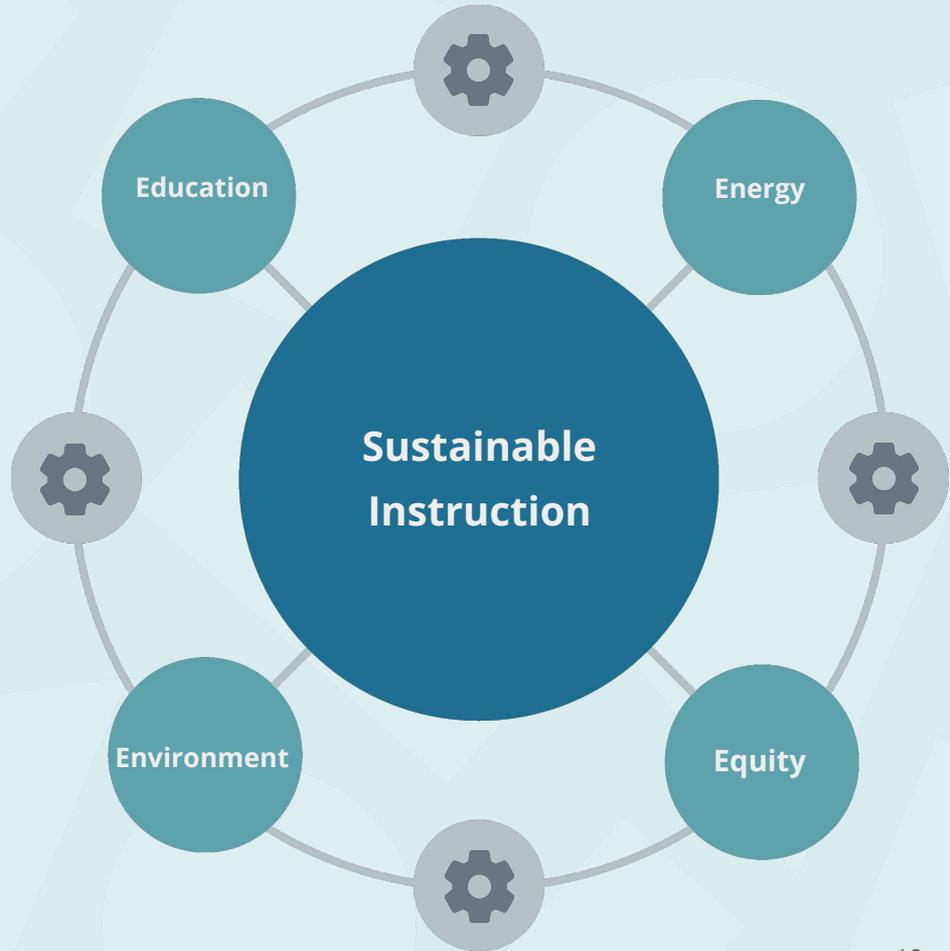

Framework of Support

Zimmerman's model of Self-Regulated Learning (SRL), is a proactive approach that enables learners to take responsibility for their learning process, research shows that self-regulated students are more engaged in their learning.



Clear goals

Define the destination and milestones.



Deliberate practice

Focused effort to improve skills.



Frequent, actionable feedback

Timely guidance for improvement.



Opportunities to revise

Iterate and re-attempt based on feedback.



Motivation & agency

Foster ownership and desire to learn.

How can I apply this in practice?

Have one or more required long-form writing assignments or projects in a semester? Apply Zimmerman's Self-Regulated Learning (SRL) model to shift effort upstream and throughout the writing process (where learning happens), rather than just at submission.

Break up one assignment into smaller, more iterative activities:

1 | Forethought Phase (Before Writing)

Ask students to submit a 1-page Planning & Purpose Memo (graded for completion or light quality).

2 | Performance Phase (During Writing)

Ask students to pause mid-draft and provide a draft along with a light reflection (could be a peer assignment), OR utilize a AI-powered tool that provides writing feedback.

3 | Self-Reflection Phase (After Submission)

Ask students to submit a short reflection along with their final draft that reflects on their confidence, support acquired, what they learned, and how they would assess their final product as well as their growth *during the process*.

This can be written, a video submission, or a post-submission conversation or presentation.

Self Determination Theory

For *Intrinsically Motivated* learning to occur:

- Purpose
- Autonomy
- Mastery

Must be in alignment which leads to: Self-driven, engaged and effective learning

How does the case of Henrietta Lacks challenge our understanding of informed consent and the ethical responsibilities of the medical and scientific communities?

Module 7 unit 3: Henrietta's cancer cells were taken without her knowledge or consent in 1951, during treatment at Johns Hopkins Hospital. These cells, later known as HeLa cells, became one of the most important tools in medical research, contributing to breakthroughs in vaccines, cancer treatments, and more. However, neither Henrietta nor her family were informed or compensated, raising serious ethical concerns about consent, patient rights, and the exploitation of marginalized individuals in scientific research. Her case has since become a pivotal example in discussions about medical ethics and bioethics. I remember learning about this in psychology in a previous semester and I was really surprised something like that actually happened. I think now we are much much better about consent with regards to procedures but even giving out information you or your parents.

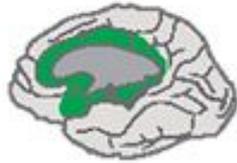

A set of principles for curriculum development that give all individuals equal opportunities to learn

Affective networks:
THE **WHY** OF LEARNING



How learners get engaged and stay motivated. How they are challenged, excited, or interested. These are affective dimensions.



Stimulate interest and motivation for learning

Recognition networks:
THE **WHAT** OF LEARNING

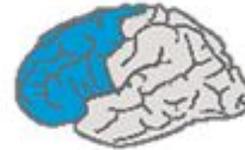


How we gather facts and categorize what we see, hear, and read. Identifying letters, words, or an author's style are recognition tasks.



Present information and content in different ways

Strategic networks:
THE **HOW** OF LEARNING



Planning and performing tasks. How we organize and express our ideas. Writing an essay or solving a math problem are strategic tasks.



Differentiate the ways that students can express what they know
